20 SAFETY TIPS FOR REALTORS TO MAKE A HABIT

1 Obtain information about the prospective buyer prior to setting up a meeting. Call in advance or provide a buyer's questionaire to be filled out online or via e-mail.

2 Meet first time clients at the office. Introduce them to co-workers and make it clear you are leaving the office to view a property together.

3 Never advertise your listing as "currently vacant."

4 Avoid showing a property at dusk or in the evening (now that autumn is upon us, this is often earlier than we anticipate).

5 Advise the homeowners to put away valuable possessions before the home showing. Provide them with a list of items to lock up in advance and schedule a walk through with them an hour before the showing to reiterate what possessions should be secured.

6 Inform a friend or colleague when and where you have a showing. Set a time they should call the police if they have not received a phone call from you.

7 Park your car in a spot where you cannot get blocked in and note the safety of the surroundings. Is there shrubbery within 10 feet that will act as a hiding place? Will it be well lit after dusk?

8 Invite neighbors to the open house and include your home inspector or escrow officer to participate in the showing with you. Make use of safety in numbers!

9 Never leave or forget the keys in the front door upon entering.

10 Lock the door behind you after entry.

11 Return the key to the lock box. Never pass off the home keys to anyone else.

12 Attach decorative bells to home entryways that are unlocked to alert you when someone ventures into the home.

13 Pick the room with the most cellular service to set up your waiting area during the open house.

14 Identify escape routes and never go into a room with a guest that does not have one (e.g. laundry rooms, bathrooms, walk-in closets, etc.). Wait just outside the doorway while they explore.

15 Do not lead the home showing; guide it. Allow guests to walk in front of you and direct them where to head.

16 Keep children insight. You're not the babysitter, but certainly wouldn't want something harmful to happen while you're responsible for the space.

17 Retrace steps and lock all doors before leaving. Buyers may have separated and opened doors that you didn't plan to.

18 Keep an eye on prized possessions by setting up a security camera or download an app that allows you to turn your phone/tablet into one (there are several available for free!)

19 Look around when walking to and from your car (especially in the dark). Lurking criminals are less likely to attack when they percieve you are aware of your surroundings.

20 Trust your intuition! If a situation doesn't feel right, find an alternative way to proceed.
